The Critical Need for Government Agencies to Utilize Document Redaction Services

Executive Summary

State government agencies throughout the nation are tasked with managing vast amounts of sensitive data. This includes personally identifiable information (PII), protected health information (PHI), and commercially confidential information (CCI).

With increasing public records requests agencies face the dual challenge of ensuring transparency while safeguarding privacy. Introduction

State government agencies are entrusted with sensitive records, from court documents and police reports to medical records and financial statements. The Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), enacted in 1967, and state laws like California's Public Records Act (CPRA) mandate public access to government records, except for exempted information such as PII or classified data.

Research from the University of Illinois highlights that thousands of publicly released documents, including FOIA responses, expose personal details due to improper redaction (UIC Today, 2015).

Professional document redaction services address these challenges by ensuring compliance with regulations like FOIA, the Federal Information Security Management Act (FISMA), and the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). This white paper explores why state agencies must adopt professional services to protect data, meet legal obligations, and enhance efficiency.



The Growing Need for Document Redaction in State Government

1. Regulatory Compliance and Legal Obligations

State agencies must comply with federal and state privacy laws when handling public records requests. Key regulations include:

• Freedom of Information Act (FOIA): FOIA grants public access to federal and state agency records but includes nine exemptions, such as personal

- privacy and national security. Agencies must redact exempted information, like Social Security numbers or witness identities, before disclosure.
- Federal Information Security Management Act (FISMA): Enacted in 2002, FISMA requires agencies to ensure the confidentiality and integrity of federal information systems, including redacting PII in public-facing documents.
- State-Specific Laws: Laws like New Jersey's Daniel's Law (2020) protect public officials' personal information (e.g., home addresses) from disclosure, while California's CPRA (effective 2023) mandates redaction of sensitive data in public records.
- **HIPAA and Other Sector-Specific Rules**: Agencies handling medical records (e.g., state health departments) must redact PHI, such as patient names or medical record numbers, per HIPAA.


Non-compliance risks fines, lawsuits, and reputational damage. For example, in 2024, one lawsuit against the social media app Tik Tok, improper redactions led to internal communications, research, and documents being exposed. This exposure of confidential information led to extensive damage to Tik Tok's reputation (Allyn, 2024). Improper redaction in FOIA responses led to



privacy violations in multiple state agencies, exposing PII like Social Security numbers. Professional redaction services ensure adherence to these complex standards.

2. Rising Volume of Public Records Requests

The volume of FOIA and state open records requests has surged, driven by increased public awareness and digital access. Agencies face tight deadlines, as



some jurisdictions mandate responses within days making manual redaction unsustainable. For instance, California's AB 1466 (2021) requires counties to redact discriminatory language from historical property records, a task involving millions of documents. Without solutions provided by professional document redaction services, agencies struggle to meet turn-around times, risking legal penalties.

3. Risks of Inadequate Redaction

Improper redaction methods, such as blacking out text with transparent markers or failing to remove metadata, expose sensitive data. A 2021 report noted that scanned documents often retain visible redacted text due to poor techniques,

enabling unauthorized access to PII. Un-redacted documents can compromise investigations or endanger individuals.

Common risks include:

- **Privacy Breaches**: Exposed PII (e.g., Social Security numbers, addresses) can lead to identity theft or fraud.
- **National Security Threats**: Un-redacted classified information, such as intelligence sources, risks harm to state or federal operations.
- Legal Liability: Agencies face lawsuits for violating privacy laws like HIPAA or CPRA.
- **Public Trust Erosion**: Data leaks undermine confidence in government transparency.

Professional redaction services mitigates these risks with a multistage process combining automation to scan for PII/PHI and manual review by experts to catch nuanced data, such as handwritten notes or ambiguous text.

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4. Resource Constraints and Operational Efficiency

Manual redaction is time-consuming, diverting staff from core duties. For example, paralegals in government legal departments can spend 50-70% of their time redacting, equivalent to two full-time salaries per 100,000 pages. In-house redaction also requires ongoing training to stay updated on compliance standards thereby straining budgets.

Offloading redaction needs to a service like Hill Redaction Services frees resources for mission-critical tasks. Their scalable solutions handle fluctuating
